From the Director's Desk...

These words of author, leader and wise woman, Rachel Naomi Remen, caught my attention. I have been reflecting on the activity of the Spiritual Life Center these past two months. It was been a particularly vibrant time when we have balanced both the times of ending for the summer and the possibilities of new life and growth for the future.

Early May we celebrated the last class for the Pathways of Spirituality and the Spiritual Direction Internship. These two intensive programs raise deep questions about how to negotiate life in awareness, service, and community in a way that respects the movement of the Spirit and the demands of one's life.

In-service programs for spiritual directors and pastoral leaders are raising question on The Shadow and the Mystery of Evil, working through Grief, learning to talk and listen to folks across a vast faith experience.

This spring a renewed Formation in Supervision program was implemented for those feeling called to help other spiritual directors in their growth and development as spiritual guides and companions. Once again the questions morph from what to do toward how to be present and attentive to one another in a manner that is every more free and open.

The first two weeks of June found several groups celebrating brunch, lunch or supper on the porch as Peer Supervision groups took a summer break. Even as blessings and challenges were acknowledged, the questions tended to be more about summer travel, good books to read and how to enjoy some down time.

A rather poignant conversation arose within the Open Circle group among the women who were wives and widows of World War II veterans. The wondered about the effects of war on those in harm's way at so young an age and the memory and scars and secrets their husbands carried.

As we move into summer, I wonder what are the questions you holding this season. Are there urgent ones that really need concrete answers and actions? Are there other ones that tend to lead to some reflection and contemplation? Are some just begging for a hearing in "good company"?

I pray that these months offer you some opportunity of living with those deeper questions and sharing with some fine companions in the midst of the beauty and abundance of the season.

Revisiting the Center's Strategic Plan

Board and staff members of the Spiritual Life Center met on retreat in early February with the goal of reviewing and revising our strategic plan. By noon, we realized that, 1) we have accomplished much in the past year, and 2) there is still much more to be done. Words from one of Robert Frost's poems echoed in my consciousness: *The woods are lovely, dark and deep, but I have promises to keep...and miles to go before I sleep, and miles to go before I sleep.*

We moved into the afternoon buoyed up by hope and enthusiasm, eager to build on the work that had been completed successfully. Each of the seven points of our Seven-Point Plan was addressed by a small work group whose members were charged with addressing current tactics that had not been executed and/or developing new, additional tactics. We sensed the need to focus in two particular areas of the Seven-Point Plan...outreach and finance...yet keep pressing forward with the others.

The seven strategies with one or two or no specific examples of objectives/tactics are:

- * Equip and sustain the community of Spiritual Directors. Equip Spiritual Directors and Supervisors by offering in-service, interfaith seminars twice a year. Sustain program graduates by celebrating the 20th Anniversary of the Spiritual Directors' Internship Program.

- * Expand relationships that focus on the sharing and exploration of spiritual experience across faith communities. Expand relationships with the Jewish community by exploring the use of co-facilitators for in-service seminars. Expand relationships with the

Muslim community by involving speakers in the Internship and Pathways Programs.

- * Expand marketing and public relations for the Center. Further utilize our promotional DVD by airing our 3-part DVD on additional community public TV stations. *Note: if you would like a copy of our DVD to explain and promote the Center and spiritual direction, please contact the office via phone or e-mail.*

- * Solidify administrative and Board structures. Develop short- and long-term succession plans. Recruit additional Board members. *Note: If you have an interest in becoming a Board or Board Committee member, please contact me.*

- * Assure financial viability of the Center. Create a planned giving strategy. Secure grants for technology and programs.

- * Create new places for our work. Develop satellite locations for spiritual direction. Take our capabilities/workshops "on the road."

- * Expand our programming that invites and nurtures. Conduct a needs survey for the wider community. Continue improving and supplementing our long- and short-term programs.

As we closed our retreat, I was extremely thankful for the energy and dedication given to the Center by its staff and Board members. And the words of e.e. cummings returned to me once again: *I thank you God, for most this amazing day.* May we move forward, with God's grace, to make it an amazing year.

Pathways of Spirituality - Fall 2009

The Pathways of Spirituality program is an enlivening program which has proven to stimulate minds, awaken hearts and touch spirits during the past year. As an "interspiritual program," it considers specific topics from the perspective of the wisdom found in diverse faith traditions. It seeks to illuminate the commonalities and differences among religious experiences. The goal of Pathways is not to blend traditions together but rather to allow participants to deepen and amplify their own spiritual paths in their search for the Divine. For this reason, the core of the program is a combination of personal experience, group interaction and multi-media instruction.

The Pathways program for the Fall, "Called to Community," will examine the relationship and

dynamics between the individual and a faith community. Topics such as "*Exploring Community*," "*Blessings and Challenges of a Spiritual Community*," "*Mind, Body, and Spirit in Community*," and "*Suffering, Death and Grief in Community*," will be explored and reflected upon. Also included will be a one day retreat titled, "*Ritual and Community*," and a closing project titled "*Your Ideal Spiritual Community*."
